

Chair of proceedings and Patron Julieanne Gilbert noted that all relevant reports are presented within the official Annual Report document.

Some presenters addressed the meeting highlighting certain aspects of their report.

Executive Chairman's Report

Presented by John Taylor.

John related to some of the projects undertaken by the Executive Committee along with the close association which still exists between the Scouts and the local Rotary Clubs. This connection has served us well for many years dating back to mid to late 1920's.

Treasurers Report

Presented by Margaret Hodda.

On behalf of the committee Margaret acknowledged the efforts of Reg Ross who has worked tirelessly to perform his duty as Treasurer as well as acting Secretary of the Region Executive. A job very well done and his will be big shoes to fill. Reg is currently at Ayres Rock enjoying a well deserved break.

Points noted in the report:

- This financial year runs for 13 months instead of the usual 12 months which is due to the amalgamation of the Central and Coastal Region and the Capricorn Region effective 1st May 2016.
- The insurance amount paid is much higher than usual due to two bills being received in the 13 months period instead of only one in the normal 12 month period.
- Supply of gas to Rowallan Park was provided at no cost for some time. A new company
 has taken over and we are now billed but do receive a discount which is appreciated.
- Repairs to buildings costs were mostly generated by broken pipes causing leaks in the water supply.
- Income from use of Rowallan Park is quite stable.

Region Commissioners Report

Presented by Region Commissioner Dougal McWhinney.

Points noted in the report:

- Membership was affected by the downturn in the coal industry but the Region still had a 3% increase for the 2015-2016 Scouting year.
- Six Wood Badges were presented to Leaders in April with two more a month later.
- The first ScoutCare event which was an all abilities activity was attended by over 100 youth members. BRAVO to Katrina Hoare and her committee for organising this event.

- The awarding of a grant for \$140,000 from the Mackay Regional Council "Better Community Building Fund" for the construction of a 12m abseil tower at Rowallan Park.
- The recent amalgamation of the Central and Coastal and Capricorn Regions.

Dougal expressed his thanks to Lance Hodda and team for their untiring efforts in progressing Rowallan Park to the level it is now. To the local Rotary Clubs and community organisations for their continued support and to all members of Scouting regardless of their role, for their continued support, passion and enthusiasm for Scouting.

Following the presentation of reports Patron Julieanne Gilbert commented on the activities of the Region which she considered to have been fantastic and the organisation has been amazing. Everything appears to run like clockwork and the standard is truly great.

General Business

There were no items of General Business relative to the Annual Report Presentation.

Address by Kirsty M Brown (OAM) Chief Commissioner of Scouts Queensland

Kirsty spoke of her last months as the Chief that will end on 31 October 2016. However, she will be acting in the capacity of Chief Commissioner until 14 November 2016. Darryl Scott is the Chief Commissioner elect.

In her 4.5 years as Chief Commissioner she has helped develop a new vision for Queensland Branch. With youth membership currently sitting at about 10,000 it is now the focus to retain the members. Loss of members and retention is an issue across the State. Rovers seem to be hard hit with the loss even felt in Brisbane. There is a World Scouting goal of 100 million members by 2020.

The Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse has had six claims investigated that occurred between 1969 and 1989. These have been referred to the Government Redress Scheme. This is a reminder that these things do not go away just because they happened in the past.

The Youth Program Review has stalled while they work with the governors to work through the Promise and Law. There will be two variations – one old and one new.

Both the Australian Jamboree and World Jamboree attracted many youth members and it is heartening to see that Scouting is still relevant to so many.

The Foundations of the Future workshops were extremely worthwhile and feedback suggests it was long overdue. It was a great weekend.

The merger of the Central and Coastal Region with Capricorn Region needs the support of both the old parts to come together to form a new Region. Kirsty expressed her faith in Dougal's ability to lead the new Region to a fruitful future.

General Manager Trevor Ruthenberg is currently working with Scouts Queensland to ensure compliance with all forms of legislation. This cannot be pushed under the carpet and it is imperative that we work together to ensure we are fully compliant in all areas.

The abseil tower is a wonderful addition to the Region and Kirsty was glad it was going ahead. The Region is doing well with lots of youth attending Scouts and receiving high level awards.

The Chief Commissioner together with the Region Commissioner presented Rowan Cahill with his 5 Year Service Award and Margaret Hodda with her 55 Year Service Award.

Meeting Closed

Chair of proceedings Patron Julieanne thanked Kirsty for her informative address. She thanked all for attending the meeting which then concluded with prayer led by Rowan Cahill.

Meeting closed at 8.30pm followed by a light supper.

Region Commissioner

Well, we have come to the end of the first year of the new region and Groups in the region report they have had another great year of Scouting, with many fun and enjoyable activities.

In May 2016, the Central and Coastal Region and Capricorn Regions were merged to become one region. Competitions were held to both name the region and design a new badge for the region. The name for the combined was decided on "Central Coast Region" and the new badge design is on the front of the region report. The new combined region covers groups from Bowen in the north, to Gladstone in the south and west to Biloela.

During the year Promise Challenge Awards (Joey Scouts), Grey Wolf awards (Cub Scouts), Australian Scout Medallions (Scouts) and Queen Scout Awards (Venturer Scouts) were achieved in the region. These are the highest awards in each of the sections and take considerable effort to achieve. Congratulations to all the recipients as well as to the leaders and parents that assisted the youth member along the way. I look forward to attending more in the coming year.

I am pleased to report that youth membership in Central Coast Region experienced a 4.6% increase for the 2015 – 2016 Scouting year. The northern region (Bowen to Mackay) experienced a 1.0% increase in youth numbers. The central region (Rockhampton-Yeppoon-Gracemere-Biloela) experience a 9.9% increase in youth numbers and the southern region (Gladstone-Calliope-Boyne Tannum) experienced a 2.8% increase in youth numbers.

Unfortunately, adult leadership numbers dropped a little and we have lost a few good leaders for various reasons. Training of leaders locally in a timely manner is still an ongoing issue.

ROWALLAN PARK CAMPSITE AND ACTIVITY CENTRE REPORT

Big first year for myself in the role of ARC Campsites (North). It's been an interesting transition from Scout Leader to Leader of Adults and I'm finding there's not much difference between adults and the Scouts. ©

Rowallan Park has gone ahead in leaps and bounds with new constructions of mountain bikers shed, abseiling tower, workshop (in initial stages) and road repairs all thanks to grants from Gambling, Regional Council and Sports. All up Grants are approx. \$240,000.00 and hopefully more to come. Bunnings also donated 15 folding tables and Coates donated 50+ plastic chairs.

Asbestos has also been inspected and signed off thanks to Bob Hodda racing around a couple of hours before inspection to finish it off.

The Works Team has now been merged with the Fellowship and numbers for both have increased from about 15 to almost 30. Aging from 16 to I won't say (a). We have seven members who are always out there doing maintenance, mowing and whatever else needs doing. The rest are helping behind the scenes as well as working with the Mountain Bike Club.

Water problems underground and from the sky were and is still are an issue and will probably be on going. Every time we replace or repair, up pops another leak and the water table in the Park is maxed as the road into the Park was not usable from springs and the Park was closed a lot over the wet season. We are automating the pump system and hopefully that will make it easier. From this I ended up meeting the owners of the road, Brian and Thelma Shields and we are now on a good path.

Origin Energy has installed a 5KW to the grid system on the activity shed and electricity used will be charged at a lower rate. We will approach them again to install on the workshop shed.

Rowallan Park had it fees increased for the first time in five years. This has applied to everyone, MAD Mountain Bikers, Camp Eagle, all the Scout groups and the public. Feedback from increases has been positive with only a few complaints.

There have been a few events held at the Park from Scouting, All Disability, Cutters pre-season training camp and Obstacle Hell course. They are all rebooking again for next year. Schools, Army and Navy cadets have been using the area for training and navigation.

I would like to thank everyone on the Executive and the Fellowship for their patience in my transition to this role. I wasn't sure what I was getting myself into but everyone has been helpful.

SEONEE PARK

For this year, Seeonee Park was used for 159 days out of the 365 days available. A large majority of these days were more than one user. The Park has been used by many organisations including CQ Laser Skirmish, Rockhampton Trials, Rockhampton Mountain Bike Club, CQ 4 WD Club, Bahais of Rockhampton, University of Queensland (Geology), 4WD Training Companies and Scout groups.

The majority of bookings are between March and September. This is mainly due to weather conditions. The Scout Groups are the minority of users of Seeonee Park, as there are groups who use other facilities to camp rather than supporting Seeonee. While this is not a problem, do these other facilities meet QBSI (Queensland Branch Scouting Instructions) and Policy and Rules requirements.

A Scout Plan has been developed with a large number of projects being developed. These include Kitchen upgrades to both Camp Petrel and Brown Hut, Ceiling in Dorms, Activity Areas, Obstacle Course, upgrade of Showers and Toilets - Brown Hut, Go Kart track etc. All these projects will take time and funds.

Looking forward to the next year.

Expeditions for QV (Queensland Venture) were organised and another for AV2018 are in planning. To support this, Branch Adventurous Activities and AV (Australian Venture) have provided myself the opportunity to RPL my Caving skills to Assessor Level in Caving. I am not looking at organising training sessions for youth and adults in Level 1 & 2 Caving.
- I have also completed my Basic Leader of Adults training and completed the course work for my Advanced Leader of Adults with just the project to finalise.
- A large number of other Leaders in the area have achieved their Basic and Advanced Leader of Adults in relevant areas.
- There have been a number of combined Group, Area and Region Activities from Joey Scout Jaunts, Scout Totems and JOTA (Jamboree On The Air) and JOTI (Jamboree On The Internet).
- Biloela Scout Group has reformed and is well supported, very active and working hard to bring their facilities and assets back to a high standard. This group have a lot of energy and support from the local community
- Area Group Leader Meetings and Leader Meetings continue to be infrequent. This is due to support and availability of the ARC Group Support and Group Leaders and Leaders. This will continue to be an area for further improvement in 2017-2018.
- Still need to find an ARC Group Support South to help in the Southern Area
- With Caving activities continuing to increase in the Rockhampton area I am finding it hard to manage both the ARC Group Support Role and the adventurous activities role

- Warripari Adventurer Level hike which included part of Limestone Ridge and an overnight stay in a cave
- CQ Health 2017 Sports and Health Expo provided opportunity for Scouts to promote themselves in the Rockhampton Area
- Completion of Leader of Adults Basic Training and Advanced Training Courses (awaiting finalisation of project)
- Participation in RPL weekend for Assessor Level in Caving
- Central and Southern Areas have combined JOTA/JOTI Camps in each area
- Running of a 5 day advanced Caving trip for 4 Venturers from across Central and Northern Queensland
- Planning underway for an Australian Venture Caving Expedition for early 2018

Well once again this year has been fairly busy with a range of opportunities to get out and about, Adventurous and not so Adventurous.

In my role of Adventurous Activities I have the opportunity to work with abseiling, rope and water related activities and other activities that fit under that line you find in all your employment contracts "any other Duties or Activities".

On the rope related side of things I travelled to Bundaberg to be assessed to run the abseil tower down there so I can be accredited to run the abseil tower here in Mackay. As a team we assisted Scoutfest 2016 in the running of the temporary 8.5m abseil tower that was constructed for the event by MI Scaffold. We also had the Rope bridge, Low Ropes and Hill Abseiling for the younger participants.

We also saw the start of the abseil tower construction with the turning of the first sod by Mayor Greg Williamson. This has been made possible by a Mackay Regional Council Grant.

We have also been able to get a Level 1 Canoe Course here in Mackay to skill up some of our youth and Leaders in the area. I also assisted in the running of Central Coast Venture at Kinchant Dam for the Venturer Scouts and Rover Scouts in November. We had canoes and kayaks and also powerboats for tubing, which saw everyone having fun for the whole weekend.
