The year has seen a number of well deserved achievements being recognised from adults through to youth members. It is very pleasing to see the increase in Scout Medallions being awarded.



Mackay District Jota / Joti report for VK4SMK

The Mackay district now has a permanent club call Sign VK4SMK.

The radios were operated from 11.00 am on Saturday until about 01.00 on Sunday morning.

We had 5 Amateur radio operators over that period of time supervising the radios.

While we only had 5 contacts on HF (4 on 20 Meters and 1 on 80 Meters) all of which was to other Australian Jota stations, most of these were for the duration of a minimum of 30 minutes to a maximum of about 3 hours as both stations had the youth keeping the hot seat warm.

Also used for the first time by us was a new method of talking which is a method a linking two radio repeaters together over the internet, this iscalled the IRLP (Internet Radio Linking Project). This enables 2 radio repeaters to be tied together by "dialing" up the other repeaters address and calling to see if any one is listening. Just for information there are 28 pages of address to choose from. We had 2 contacts with the United Kingdom using this method and 3 more to other Australian Jota stations.

The equipment used was a HF transmitter and a commercial VHF high band radio with the local 2 Meter repeater channels for the IRLP.

For the Joti side of the weekend we had between 7 and 14 computers (they kept breaking as they are all fairly old klunkers) operating at the camp. They were all interconnected over a LAN which was connected to the internet courtesy of Telstra Country wide by a satellite up link /down link as there is no phone lines available yet for a land line. There were a few teething problems networking the computers and some time was wasted until this could be resolved.

Other activities that were run on the afternoon were:-A foxhunt - trying to find another radio by direction finding:-A GPS hunt - like an orienteering course except that a GPS was used:-

an Activities base run by the Venturer Scouts, incorporating 5 mini bases:- and hand held radios for the youth member to communicate with each other around the campsite.

Most groups camped for the Saturday night The Guides organized themselves for the weekend but participated in the activities.

65 youth member, 10 section leaders, 14 Regional Leaders, 1 Rover, 5 Radio Operators, 16 Guides, 3 Guide Leaders, and 8 helpers participated in activities at Jota and Joti.

I still do not have a structural engineer to sign off on the tower and hope to have this before the start of the Scouting year in 2005.

If anyone has the contact details for a structural engineer who is prepared to look at and certify the designs PLEASE contact me. The engineer who offered the service previously has not completed the task and I am having difficulty in contacting him.
