Region Commissioner's Report

Youth membership in the region has started to climb over the last couple of months. The total number of youth members in the region is 165 comprising of 21 Joey Scouts, 55 Cub Scouts, 62 Scouts, 19 Venturer Scouts and 8 Rover Scouts. This count is up 3% since 01 April 2013. At present, we have 26 Leaders (section/group), 21 Support Members (Adult Members & Helpers), 19 Region Leaders and 8 Fellowship members. Last week the total youth count for the state passed 10,000, which is quite an achievement. It has been many years since the state has had that many youth members.

During June, I was out of the region due to work commitments and during this time, Margaret Hodda (ARC Training & Development) was Acting Region Commissioner. She did a great job and I thank her for stepping in and doing the role.

In July, I attended the Region Commissioners conference and there was a lot of discussion on the Region Review that had been completed and tabled at the RC conference at the beginning of the year. There are some changes across QLD to some regions as noted in the recent memo from the Chief but at present we remain unchanged. I am however required to continue to grow the youth numbers in the region and where possible start at least one new group somewhere in the region.

The other item that appeared on the RC conference agenda was the issue of leader training. During recent investigations and audits of various QLD Scouts policies, the auditor noted that some leaders had not completed their final training. A few leaders had been in the movement for a long time and had not even started their training. We are currently working with the training team to ensure that all leaders receive full training in the required time.

In August, we held our Annual Region Management Seminar (ARMS), which was attended by the QLD Chief Commissioner. The seminar was well attended by the leaders from the region and good discussion was held on many topics. Risk Assessment was one of the big ones and I am endeavouring to get an area available on our website where we can store risk assessment templates for various activities.

Next month is JOTA/JOTI is on and we look like having a large roll up for the region activity at Rowallan Park. Do not forget to order your badges from the Scout Supply Centre.

Harry Roestenburg signed up as an eight year old Cub Scout in Geelong, Victoria and has been a member of scouting since then. On Saturday 31st August 2013 the Scouting Chief Commissioner of Queensland Mrs Kristy Brown OAM, presented Harry with his 35 year long service badge for his service as a leader and The Silver Kangaroo, the highest adult recognition award in Scouting, for Eminent Achievement and Meritorious Service to Scouting.

Harry signed up as the Assistant Scout Leader in Geelong in 1974, and later became the Assistant Venturer Scout Leader in Geelong. He moved to Queensland and became the ASL for the Bundamba Scout Group, at Ipswich, and then transferred to Milbank Scout Group in Bundaberg. As a youth member Harry achieved the Queens Scout Award.

The Rover Advisor is there to guide the

young people to review all choices before they make decisions. Harry said that being a Rover Advisor has been very rewarding and now many of the young people he has guided through their journey in scouting are personal friends, which now includes their partners and children. A highlight of scouting over the years for him has been the comraderie of the Rovers in Central Queensland. The Rovers from Central and Coastal Region, Central Western Region, and Capricornia Region have had many combined activities and are quick to come and help out at Region events. Harry said the major changes that he has seen over the years, is the female contribution to scouting in the Rover Scout Section and their willingness to get things done.

Over the years in scouting for Central and Coastal Region Harry has also done his fair share of work at Rowallan Park, at working bees and making improvements to the facilities.

The fact of having worked to prevent the recurrence of those evils which, if allowed to run on, would soon be rotting our youth, gives a man the solid comfort that he has done something, at any rate, for his country, however humble may be his position.

This is the spirit with which Scout Leaders and Commissioners work in the Scout Movement.

The credit for the organization and the spread of the Scout Movement is due to this army of voluntary workers. Here we have remarkable – if silent – evidence of the fine patriotic spirit that lies beneath the surface of most nations. These men give up their time and energies, and in many cases their money as well, to the work of organizing the training of boys, without any idea of reward or praise for what they are doing. They do it for the love of their country and their kind.

150 YEARS COMMEMORATION OF MACKAY SOUTH SEA ISLANDERS

Some Scouting members in Central and Coastal Region were honoured to serve Billy Tea and Damper for morning tea to bus load of members of the South Sea Islander Community and other interested people who went on a tour of the Mackay area visiting 10 significant sites on the tour organised by the Mackay Festival of Arts.

Rowallan Park was one of the historical sites on the tour as there a number of Kanaka graves where there were multiple burials in the days of their indentured labour in the establishment of sugarcane farms in the area. Scouting members have been responsible for maintaining and preserving these graves for many years.
